Here are a few ways you'll notice these developments as they happen:






- Shows interest in other children
- Plays simple pretend games
- Imitates behaviors
- Repeats behaviors to get attention
- Says "no"
- Shows feelings such as fear of strangers, affection with familiar people, temper tantrums, and clinging to familiar adults

- Engages in side-by-side play with other children
- Gets excited when with other children
- Begins to assert independence
- Comforts others and tries to make them laugh with words or actions
- Understands "no" but may have trouble controlling feelings or actions
- Notices likenesses and differences between self and others
